

The distinguished critic Robert Brustein explores the impact of Henrik Ibsen on the modern theater. ---- Nineteenth-century audiences looked to the theater for comfort and affirmation, but in mid-century this ease began to disappear. Modern drama brought to the stage an attitude of revolt. It often became, in the words of the distinguished critic Robert Brustein, "relentless, inconsolable, bleak." The new playwright spread "a gospel of insurrection, trying to substitute his inspired vision for traditional values, trying to improvise a ritual out of anguish and frustration. Instead of myths of communion, he offers myths of dispersal; instead of consoling sermons, painful demands; instead of a liturgy of acceptance, a liturgy of complaint." The man who first brought the theater to this confrontation with reality was Henrik Ibsen. Rather than simply creating a clever plot, Ibsen presents the characters of contemporary society and their psychological conflicts. He is the progenitor of modern drama. Here Mr. Brustein explores the nature of his revolt. ----- National Medal of Arts winner Robert Brustein founded the American Repertory Theatre Company in 1979 and for twenty-two years was its artistic director as well as professor of English at Harvard University. Born in New York City, he studied at Amherst College, the Yale Drama School, and Columbia University. He later taught at Columbia and Yale, where he founded the Yale Repertory Theatre and was dean of the Yale School of Drama. For more than forty-five years Mr. Brustein served as drama critic for The New Republic. Among his seventeen books are The Theatre of Revolt, Seasons of Discontent, The Third Theatre, Revolution as Theatre, Critical Moments, Making Scenes, Who Needs Theatre, Reimagining American Theatre, Dumbocracy in America, Cultural Calisthenics, The Siege of the Arts, and The Tainted Muse. He has also written twelve plays, including The Shakespeare Trilogy "The English Channel, Mortal Terror, and The Last Will" and two Klezmer musicals, Schlemiel the First and King of the Schnorrers. --- The Revolt of Henrik Ibsen is published by Now and Then Reader, digital publishers of serious nonfiction.
